CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college follows the curriculum implemented by the University of Kerala. The college strictly follows the academic calendar issued by the University. At the beginning of the academic year college level and department level meetings are conducted to evaluate strength and weakness. Semester wise academic plans are prepared separately by each department. Individual work diary is maintained by faculty members. Academic and library orientation are given for freshers. An effective tutorial system is maintained and remedial teaching for weak students are conducted. Student support programmes such as ASAP, SSP and WWS are successfully organized. As per university guidelines continuous internal evaluation is a major component of the curriculum adopted by our institution .The college has a well maintained documentation system. Every department maintains work diary, attendance data, CE sheets, remedial coaching details, previous question papers, assignments and records for future reference. Extra curricular achievements of students are also documented. Systematic interaction and mentoring of wards are provided. The College offers a bridge course to the newly admitted students. Our students are coming from four Streams of Higher Secondary Education namely HSE, CBSE, ISCE, VHSE and usually they struggle during the initial semester of first Degree Programs due to language barrier and IT skills. The bridge course given emphasizes to equip the students with the University system of Education. The tutor identifies the weaker students from each class and the bridge course is given separately for Arts, Science and Commerce Students.The university curriculum stipulates a project report for all

First Degree Programme students during their 5th and 6th semester. An orientation programme on the basis of project preparation and its presentation is conducted under the leadership of each department head .This programme also gives importance in power point preparation and presentation. A mock viva voce is conducted in every department for the final year students. Model exams were conducted for both theory and practical papers. Guidelines were given for the preparation and submission of assignments and seminars. After evaluation, suggestion for improvements was given. Study tour and field visit were organized for all the final year students, to make the students aware about the real life situations. Internship was given to B.Com Hotel Management, M.Sc Physics, M.Sc Chemistry and M.Sc Geology students.

the three important stakeholders -Students, Parents and Alumni. The student feedback is collected confidentially by the principal from the students. The students were selected from all departments by applying simple random sampling technique. The collected feedback is analysed and based on which each teacher makes a self-evaluation and general remarks were discussed and corrective measures were taken. At the department level, the Head of the department collects student feedback in every semester. The effectiveness of teaching methodology adopted for each subject by each teacher is evaluated in the department meeting in the backdrop of student feedback collected by Head of the department. Remedial teaching is designed based on the student feedback and discussions in the department meeting. Feedback and suggestions were collected from parents during departmental PTA meeting. General discussions on the tutorial system were encouraged in these meetings and measures were taken to strengthen the tutorial system. Their valuable suggestions were discussed in the PTA executive meeting at the college level and implemented accordingly. A general Body meeting of the College Parent Teacher Association was held once in every year and feedback was collected from parents and plan of action of the PTA was formulated accordingly. During the year PTA has initiated and allotted funds for various activities based on this feedback. Feedbacks were collected during general and departmental alumni meeting. These meetings are the important forum to suggest and improve the teacher student relation, placement progress and our institutional facilities. The Former Students Association (FSA), with the help of Principal collects feedback from those students who avail mid day meal facility. The quality and quantity of the meal was decided on the basis of this feedback. The United Arab Emirates (UAE) chapter of the alumni association often renders their feedback on the performance of the college in curricular and co curricular activities. Their words were taken into account while formulating future plans. Apart from this, college has a mechanism to collect feedback from students who are enrolled in NCC and NSS. Principal directly collects feedback from cadets and volunteers and discussed their suggestions in the College council. The ANO and Programme officers of NSS were informed about this feedback to improve the student satisfaction. Exit feedback was also collected from the outgoing students. Student Feedback was collected at the end of each programme organised by various clubs and committees. Feedback of resource persons were also obtained in the guest register. IQAC formulates programme protocols based on this feedback.

Hand book and academic calendar is provided to every student at the beginning of the academic year. Orientation classes are given for the newly admitted students. The rules and regulations, the facilities available and the general discipline of the college are made clear during the orientation programme. The effective tutorial cum mentoring system that functions in the college identifies the gifted and the slow learners. Special attention is given to enhance their abilities. The tutors monitor the attendance, academic progress and psychological well being of the mentees. The college maintains the details of mentees including their socio-economic status. The progress and the problems of the mentees are informed to the parents. Counselling is given to students as and when required. The tutors encourage students to enroll in various clubs and to participate in various extension activities of the college. The teachers make available textbooks and study materials free of cost to the needy students. Students who are interested in arts and sports are given opportunities to showcase their talents. Academically weak students are given remedial classes after the regular class time. The internal mentors of 'Scholar Support Programme' (SSP) give additional academic support and the external mentors provide classes on life skills, comseling and psychological support for academically weak students. 'Walk with a Scholar' (WWS) provides exposure for advanced learners to indulge in inter-departmental and inter-collegiate competitions and to fetch knowledge beyond curriculum. The Under Graduate students are encouraged to pursue higher studies. The Post-graduate students are given opportunities to do project work and summer internship in prestigious institutions like GSI, CWRDM, Marine Wing GSI, NIIST, NCESS and VSSC. 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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) of UG and PG students at the institutional level is conducted as per University regulations. CE marks were awarded on the basis of Assignment, Test Paper and Attendance. Monthly attendance statements were published at the department level and the same is communicated to parents in the Class PTA meetings. The College offers a congenial and peaceful atmosphere to all students. The learning is made student centric by adopting appropriate teaching methods suitable to the learning ability of the students. Lectures are delivered with the aim that an average student would be able to assimilate the concept. Encourages interactive and collaborative learning, peer teaching, group discussions, group projects, group assignments, quiz, library usage, study tours, seminars, discussions, debates etc. Results of class tests, mid semester and semester examinations are regularly displayed in the College Notice Board. Academically weak students are advised to attend remedial coaching. Students are addressed individually regarding their performance in internal examinations. To ensure transparency in internal evaluation system College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) and Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) were constituted. Some of the assessment indicators for evaluating students' performance are: marks in internal exams, classroom performance, communication skills, activities and performance in NSS, NCC, Sports and other cultural activities. To improve the creative skills of the student teachers assign innovative project works. Students are motivated to prepare Presentations on topics related to the syllabi. Previous question papers were distributed to the students for the preparation of University examinations.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

An Academic calendar is issued by the University of Kerala at the beginning of every year. Being affiliated to the University of Kerala, our college prepares an academic cum activity calendar based on that and the same is distributed to all the stakeholders of the college. The college prepares the calendar keeping in view that the students should get adequate hours of classes and the teachers get adequate hours to transact the curriculum effectively. The activity calendar ensures the smooth conduct of all the curricular and co-curricular activities. In the beginning of each academic year, the heads of the departments, tutors, coordinators of the clubs are directed to prepare an action plan. The activities planned are scrutinsed and the college calendar is prepared by the IQAC. The college calendar consists of schedule of regular classes, internal examinations, model examinations, display of CE marks, tentative dates of arts day, college day, Merit day, Trendz Seminar series, Sports day and other events of the college. In case of occurrence of unexpected events if any, the schedule may be subjected to slight changes. If regular classes are lost due to some unavoidable reasons, extra classes are given to students. The IQAC monitors whether all the activities of the college are being carried out systematically as per the academic calendar.

Right from its inception in the year 1964, the college has been improving its infrastructure to meet the demanding needs. The college has a transparent procedure for the utilization and maintenance of all physical, academic and support facilities. The college council ensures the optimal allocation and utilization of the funds for maintenance and upgradation of infrastructure. The planning and purchase committee collects the necessary requirements from the departments at the beginning of the academic year. The requirements are analyzed and processed on the basis of priority. For this, the college utilizes the funds from Public Department Account, financial assistances from management, PTA, government agencies such as UGC, DST, KSCSTE etc. The funds are utilized strictly according to the rules and regulations. The record of purchase is maintained in the stock register .At the end of the academic year the college carries out department wise stock verification. The repair and maintenance of buildings are done on a regular basis. The housekeeping team keeps the buildings, the corridors and the premises clean and tidy. Availability of potable drinking water is ensured in the campus. Water coolers in the auditorium, air conditioners in the seminar and conference halls add to the enhancement of the physical facilities of the college. Garden committee contributes for the enhancement of greenery in the campus. Cleanliness and hygiene of the college canteen and the supply of healthy food is monitored by the canteen committee. The college library provides accessibility to resource through Inflibnet. Maintenance and repairing of IT infrastructure like Wi-Fi, broad band and updating of softwares are done as required. Maintenance of facilities and cleanliness in women's hostel is monitored by the hostel committee members. In order to ensure safety and security of students and staff, cctv cameras are installed in the campus and the same was done as per the direction from the UGC and the University. In addition to this security persons were posted for day and night watching. Adequate steps are taken for the enhancement of sports facilities and maintenance of courts. Modernization of Hotel Management laboratory is one of the outstanding works of this year. The construction of Gurumandapa is the most significant work of the year. Gurumandapa provides opportunities for students to enhance their faith and spirituality and find greater meanings to their lives.

CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The college is run by Sree Narayana (SN) Trusts which is one of the oldest educational agencies of Kerala. The Executive Committee of SN Trust is the governing Council of all the SN colleges in the State. The college has a decentralized decision making system at various levels which is responsible for the day-to-day affairs of the college. The college council has representations from all the stakeholders including teaching staff, non-teaching staff and students. The heads of the departments are officiating as members in the college Council. There are two elected representatives from the teaching staff who are democratically elected. The college superintendent is officiating as a member from the administrative wing. The Librarian is a member of the College Council. The college council ensures representation of students whenever required. Senior faculty members provide support and share responsibilities along with the principal. The young and vibrant faculty members and administrative wing actively take the responsibilities entrusted. The college has constituted IQAC as per the guidelines of NAAC. IQAC takes initiatives for the overall quality enhancement of the institution. The IQAC consists of members from teaching staff, management representative, senior administrative staff, nominees from the local society, a nominee from the industrialists and representatives from students and alumni. The various sub committees under IQAC are assigned to plan and implement academic activities for the overall quality enhancement of the institution. Throughout the academic year, the IQAC monitors various departmental and club activities. A Project Monitoring committee and a Board of Governance was constituted for the institutional level monitoring and implementation of RUSA Project as per the directions from RUSA. Office superintendent co-ordinates the routine administrative works in the office. The administrative affairs are handled smoothly by all the supporting staff members. The college has a planning board and a purchase committee coordinated by the experienced senior faculty members. A well-functioning Parent Teachers' Association is involved in the major decision making process of the college. The PTA is functioning at two levels. At the college level the general body meeting of the PTA elects an executive body which is active in the day to day activities of the college. The student facilities in the campus is evaluated by the Executive committee periodically and based on their recommendations, student amenities are provided. At the department level, class PTA meetings are conducted semester-wise. Suggestions and recommendations from the parents are discussed in the department meetings and are incorporated in future activities. Operative autonomy is granted to all departments and units in the college. The opinions and suggestions evolved from the meetings conducted at all levels in the institution are taken into consideration to ensure participative management. As representation of students is ensured in various committees, it enhances participative learning and grooming of leadership qualities among them. All the stakeholders of our institution contribute together for the smooth functioning of the machinery to realize our vision.

The computer lab with internet and LAN was used to improve the IT skill among students. ICT enabled classrooms are available in all departments. Science laboratories have been revamped.
